

# CAMPUS FUNDING RESOURCES

Currently there are six different sources of funding available on campus. Some require your group to be a registered student organization and some do not. All of the resources require their name to be placed on all of your publicity along with your organization's name. With any co-sponsorship, you should acknowledge all funding sources. Before talking to any of the following resources, your organization must create a budget for your proposed event or purpose for asking.

***Before you seek out any funding, have your financial plans in order.***

## *Associated Students of Willamette University (ASWU)*

The ASWU Vice President of Finance is the chair of the Finance Board, which reviews all funding requests. This is the main funding source for all registered organizations on campus. They have two main funding periods - one at the beginning of each semester. If you are a registered organization, then you will automatically be contacted by ASWU with their funding timeline for that particular semester. Should your organization need additional funding for any reason, you can always complete another ASWU funding request form, which the Finance Board will review and then contact you.

## *House of Hall Representatives (HHR)*

HHR is composed of the presidents, vice-presidents, secretaries and treasurers from each individual hall council. It is the representative body for those living in residence halls or University-owned apartments. You do not need to be a registered organization to request funds from HHR. In the past, they generally plan forums and social events that enrich life at Willamette. They have also planned campus-wide programs. Please visit the Office of Residence Life if you would like to request funds from HHR.

## *Panhellenic Council (PHC)*

This governing council represents the three sororities on campus. You do not need to be a registered organization to request funds. This council sponsors many social events as well as philanthropic programs. You can contact the PHC president through the Office of Student Activities for more information.

### *InterFraternity Council (IFC)*

IFC is the governing body for the five fraternities on campus. You do not need to be a registered organization to request funds from the InterFraternity Council. IFC sponsors a formal recruitment as well as other programs and events. Contact the IFC president through the Office of Residence Life for more information.

### *Campus Departments*

You do not need to be a registered organization to request funds from a department on campus. Contact the department head for more information.

### *Lilly Grant*

You do not need to be a registered organization to apply for a Lilly Grant. The goal of Lilly Outreach Grants is to connect students with service opportunities and assist them in enriching the meaning of the experience through reflection. Residence halls, sororities, fraternities, student clubs and organizations, or any group of six or more students can apply for a Lilly Grant. Funding for service includes: transportation, supplies, copying and publicity, and snacks for volunteers during service. ### *Student Organization Collaboration Fund*

The Council on Diversity and Social Justice (CDSJ) and the Associated Student of Willamette University (ASWU) have recently created and approved the Student Organization Collaboration Fund. Funding is now available for new intergroup student organization projects beginning in the fall of 2009. The Student Organization Collaboration Fund (SOCF) is designed to support and encourage intergroup collaborative programming efforts. All student organizations stand to benefit from increased diversity in membership, initiative, and perspective. More information can be found on the CDSJ and ASWU websites.

### *Sustainability Grant*

All Willamette University staff, students, and administrators in CLA, Law, Atkinson, TIUA, and School of Education are eligible to apply for a Sustainability Grant. Sustainability Grants provide Willamette community members with an opportunity to undertake projects that promote and add visibility to sustainability efforts, and build rituals and celebrations around the core values of sustainability: Equity, Environment, Economics, and Education.
