Welcome to the Psych major! Below, you will find a list of the requirements for completing the major, along with some key issues to keep in mind for schedule planning. If you have questions, please discuss them with your advisor.

Introductory Course in Psychology (4 credits total)

□ PSY210 - Introduction to Psychology (4 credits) -- may be waived with score of 4 or higher on AP Psych exam or 5 or higher on IB Psych exam

Breadth Requirement: One course in each of four "categories" (16 credits total)

□Clinical / Applied Psych

PSY342 – Clinical Psychology (PSY310 before S '21)

PSY321 – Psych for Sustainability

PSY335 – Adult Psychopathology

PSY337 – Abnormal Psych: Child/Adolescent

*PSY354 – Psych of Women & Gender (prior to F16 only)

PSY370.A – Topical Course (PSY370.A is used for additional courses in this category. Specific course titles may vary.)

PSY370.D – Topical Course (PSY370.D is used for additional courses in this category. Specific course titles may vary.)

Note: You can complete the categories in any order you wish. The breadth requirement is typically fulfilled concurrently with the Research Methods requirement (see below). Many students finish the breadth requirement during the senior year.

Research Methods & Analysis Sequence (8 credits total)

\square PSY252W - Research Methods & Analysis I (4 credits; must pass with C- or better to continue to PSY253; cannot be attempted more than 2x)
□PSY253 - Research Methods & Analysis II (4 credits)

Note: PSY253 must be completed <u>before</u> you begin your senior internship. If you are interested in a summer internship, you should complete PSY253 no later than spring of your junior year.

Senior Experience & Advanced Seminar Course (12 credits total)

 \square PSY310 – Professional and Career Planning in Psychology I (2 credits)

Taken **spring of your junior year <u>or</u> spring of sophomore year** if you plan to study abroad in spring of junior year. (Old naming and numbering: PSYC 300 –Internship Orientation.)

□ PSY410 – Professional and Career Planning in Psychology II (2 credits)

Taken fall of your senior year.

☐ PSY497 **OR** PSY498 – Research <u>or</u> Field Senior Internship in Psychology (4 credits)

This course is offered annually in the fall. You will take it fall of your **senior year**. The course includes a minimum of 168 hours in a research lab on campus (PSYC 497: research interns) or service in a field site in the local community (PSYC 498: field interns) See department web page for more details.

□ PSY431W – Topical Seminar in Psych (4 credits)

Each year, faculty offer small topical senior seminars. Plan to take one of the PSY431W offerings in fall or spring of your senior year (some students may take the course as a junior). PSY252 is required prior to taking the seminar. The seminar will be largely discussion-based, and you will write a major scholarly paper in this course.

Important Notes:

- In addition to the PSYC courses above, majors must complete one natural science (NS) course <u>outside</u> of psychology.
- If planning study abroad, it's best to go <u>prior</u> to spring of junior year (to allow PSYC 310 enrollment & timely pre-req completion).
- Of the 124 credits required for graduation, at least 76 must be from outside of psychology (note that because PSYC 497 and PSYC 498 are internship credits, either can count toward this 76 outside of psychology!). Because there are 36 other credits from PSYC-prefix courses required in the psychology major, this means that you can take three additional 4-credit PSYC courses and have them count toward your 124 required credits for graduation.
